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## Resilient vs. Adaptable

I have lived in the Greater Elkhart area for the vast majority of my life, and resiliency is one of the things people often point to as what sets our community apart from others.

The record will show that I, too, have cited resiliency as one of our core strengths.



### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I still believe that, but I now think we are shorting ourselves with that comment.

As I stated at the Greater Elkhart Chamber of Commerce 2025 Annual Meeting, the better word to describe us is adaptable.

I can hear the words of my high school psychology teacher, Mr. Campanogli, "Levon, be careful. When you use the word 'but,' people think what you say after 'but' is more important than what you said before it."

So, to be clear, I do think our adaptability is more important than our statement of resiliency. Stick with me while I explain my position.

Let's start with definitions.

**Resilient** – *able to withstand or recover quickly from difficult conditions* **Adaptable** – *able to adjust to new conditions* 

Throughout our history, Greater Elkhart has repeatedly demonstrated resiliency in difficult conditions. Recessions, harmful economic policy, weather related disasters, World Wars, and changing consumer appetites have all impacted what we do for business and how we operate business in our area.

Yet, here we are. Greater Elkhart is still here and still thriving.

Some of you may be saying to yourselves, "Levon, you just contradicted the very premise of your earlier argument." Hold on.

To hear us tell it, Greater Elkhart is resilient because we are always dealing with difficult conditions.

I would argue, and the history books that tell the story of our area will back me up, that we have spent far more years in normal to above average economic conditions that have worked in our favor and allowed us to be the strong economic bellwether the rest of the nation expects.

Our business history shows that regardless of changing conditions, positive or negative, Greater Elkhart is continually innovating and showing the economic agility to move with the changing local, national, and international business and consumer demands.

In other words, things change and we adjust to become stronger.

How we do that, and who we collaborate with, changes based on the time and circumstances, but our ability to adapt makes the Greater Elkhart business environment conducive for the opportunity for everyone to thrive.

Meteorologists will tell you that weather is the short-term atmospheric conditions at a specific time and place and climate is the long-term average of weather conditions over a period of time. That means weather is an important part of the larger climate discussion over time.


I would make the similar statement that our resiliency is our reaction to conditions at a specific time, and our adaptability is who we are over the long-term average of economic conditions over time.

## **Annual Meeting Awards**

#### **Business of the Year - Boling Vision Center**

Boling Vision was established in 1960 and in 1986, Dr. Richard C. Boling II joined his father in the family practice. His daughters, Hayley Boling, CEO, and Dr. Whitney Boling joined the team making the practice a third-generation family business. The Center now has ten doctors and over 100 employees serving the community. Boling Vision Center makes a conscious effort to give back to their community outside the office by being involved in local charities, events and initiatives. They developed Kindness to Prevent Blindness, a community impact program for eyecare services for school children. Since beginning more than a decade ago, this program has evolved into several outreach efforts, the most recent being the Kindness to Prevent Blindness Mobile Unit. Since the launch in 2018, they have provided local kids with 23,620 free vision screenings, 7,227 mobile unit eye health exams, and 9,914 pairs of free glasses.



The Business Recognition Council recognizes twelve businesses throughout the year for their innovative product/service, growth, community involvement, unique entrepreneurial story, and impact on the local economy.

#### Nonprofit of the Year - Boys and Girls Clubs of Elkhart County

The Boys and Girls Clubs of Elkhart County has been a force for good in the lives of youth for more than 65 years. The club exists to elevate the youth of our community, and let them know they are capable, worthy, and important. Boys and Girls Clubs offer safe places where young people can learn, grow, and succeed. They focus on academic success, career development/workforce readiness, good character and citizenship, and healthy lifestyles. The Boys and Girls Clubs serve more than 7,500 of Elkhart County's youth annually.

Each year The Greater Elkhart Chamber's Business Recognition Council recognizes one outstanding nonprofit organization that serves our community. Throughout the year we honored four nonprofits, and selected the Nonprofit of the Year from those winners.





#### **Century Plus Community - Bull Moose Tube**

Bull Moose<sup>®</sup> Tube, a part of the Caparo family of companies, is one of the largest North American producers of HSS and mechanical tubing, and the market leader in sprinkler pipe. The Elkhart facility began as Bock Industries and was purchased by Bull Moose Tube Company in 1990. They form tube directly from steel coil, eliminating a mother tube or prior-stage process. This approach enables them to start with only the highest-grade steel, create less scale, form sharper corners, craft the straightest tube, and make the most consistent welds.

The Century Plus Community Award is presented annually to a Chamber member business or organization who has operated in our region for 100 consecutive years or more.





The Elkhart Leadership Academy, a program of the Greater Elkhart Chamber of Commerce, engages participants to strengthen themselves, their organizations, families, and communities through service and leadership. The Academy has had 818 graduates, and the 2024-25 Class is the 37th graduating class.



The ten-month program combines key community issues and enhanced leadership skill development to advance community stewardship. Presentations, hands-on experiences, exclusive tours, DiSC assessments and work on nonprofit impact projects are a part of the monthly sessions. Topics include: Arts and Culture, Education, Diversity, Media, Community Service, Communication, Team Building, Critical Conversations, and Economic & Community Development. Academy sessions take place August – May.

After orientation in August, members embark on an overnight retreat in September. Subsequent sessions are full-day experiences each month. Members also work each week on small group projects for local nonprofit organizations and serve a one-year board of directors internship. Participation is limited to 30 individuals.

The nonprofit organizations supported this year include LoveWay, Inc. – Equine Assisted Services, Rose Garden Recovery Community, Startup Moxie Elkhart County, and STAY Indiana (STEM in Aviation Youth). Projects range from community awareness and fundraising to event planning and process improvements.



The program culminates with a Graduation and a presentation of the impact team projects. This year's Graduation will be at 11:30 am on Wednesday, May 14 in the Crystal Ballroom at the Lerner, and is open to the public. Register at Elkhart.org

#### What makes the work of the Ambassadors Council effective?

**Samuel:** We are a group of enthusiastic business professionals that see the value of a strong relationship with other businesses that the Chamber cultivates. The purpose of our council is member retention. The Steering Committee goes over ways we can do that better as a council. We pick a topic that helps the Council Members when talking about the Chamber with different business owners.

John: The council is made up of more than 30 incredibly talented people who have excellent networking skills and are remarkably adept at managing busy schedules for their own business. Job one for the Ambassadors is retaining Chamber members. We were charged by CEO Levon Johnson to fill our Ambassador Council maximum membership to 40 this year, and we're working close to it! We're also adept at fleshing out member events, like Business After Hours, Member Anniversary Presentations and reaching out to each member, each year, with retention phone calls or visits. We like to be "high touch" as much as is feasible. Having good attendance at member events also sends the signal that members are welcome and that we back them.

#### What makes the work of the Leadership Council effective?

We combine leadership development with real-life community engagement for the Elkhart Leadership Academy. We don't just talk about leadership – we give people the tools and confidence to actually be leaders in their communities. Each session is designed to build skills like self-awareness and communication while diving into important local issues. It's this mix of personal growth and community focus that makes the experience so powerful.

#### How do you decide the focus of the Leadership Academy each year?

Each year, we take a close look at what's happening in the community – what challenges people are facing, what opportunities are out there – and we shape our sessions around those. We also stay connected with local leaders and organizations to make sure we're keeping things fresh, relevant, and impactful. The goal is to make sure participants are learning about the things that really matter right now.

#### What are the most impactful outcomes of the Leadership Council?

It's been amazing to watch our alumni step up in big ways. Many of them have taken on leadership roles in local organizations, joined nonprofit boards, or started projects that directly help the community. But even beyond those big moves, we've seen a shift – people walk away from this program more aware, more connected, and more motivated to serve. That ripple effect is what makes the biggest impact. This isn't just a leadership class. It's a community. It's about stepping up, giving back, and being part of something bigger than yourself. When you're ready to grow and serve, the Elkhart Leadership Academy is ready for you.
